- 3. **Schedule:** Contestants may choose one (1) Top Chef! Contest date when completing the 4-HOnline Entry Form. Top Chef! Contest details will be sent to participants prior to the Maryland State Fair.
- 4. TOP CHEF! COMPETITIONS:
 - Contestants will prepare a meal or dish in front of a live audience, demonstrating creativity and 4-H "food smarts."
 - Contestants will compete simultaneously in their own designated workspaces.
 - A kitchen (stove/oven, microwave, refrigerator) is available, but will be shared by all contestants. Please request use on the entry form. Bringing your own hot plate or electric skillet and extension cord is highly recommended.
 - 4-H'ers must provide their own ingredients, tools/materials, and presentation supplies.
 - Arrive at least 15 minutes prior to the contest start time.
 - All ingredients must be prepared and measured during the contest.
 - Kitchen and food safety guidelines must be followed:
 - a. Practice good personal hygiene wear a clean apron; if you have long hair, tie it back; wash hands after touching your hair or face.
 - b. Wash your hands with warm water and soap for at least 20 seconds before, during, and after preparing food; this includes after handling uncooked eggs or raw meat, poultry or seafood (or their juices.)
 - c. Do not lick your fingers or food preparation utensils.
 - d. Keep food preparation surfaces clean at all times. Sanitize the table before starting your dish.
 - e. Rinse fresh fruits and vegetables under running water just before eating or adding to dishes/recipes, even if you plan to cut or peel them because bacteria can spread from the outside to the inside during cutting or peeling.
 - f. Rub firm-skinned fruits and vegetables under running tap water or scrub with a clean vegetable brush while rinsing with running tap water.
 - g. Use one cutting board for fresh produce and a separate one for raw meat, poultry, or seafood.
 - h. Wash food packaging, such as the top of cans and the lids on jars, before you open them.
 - i. Make sure perishable ingredients are kept cold during transport and at the contest.
 - j. Never place cooked food on a plate that previously held raw meat, poultry, seafood, or eggs.
 - k. Use a food thermometer which measures the internal temperature of cooked meat, poultry, and egg dishes, to make sure that the food is cooked to a safe internal temperature. See "Safe Cooking Guidelines" at https://www.foodsafety-gov/food-safety-charts/safe-minimum-internal-temperatures

- 1. The sale will take place on Monday, August 25, 2025 at 7 P.M. in the Cow Palace.
- To be eligible for the Maryland State Fair Youth Livestock Sale, you must be a Maryland 4-H or FFA member in good standing and deemed eligible by the appropriate organization.
- 3. A 4-H/FFA member may nominate only one (1) animal for the sale selection process for each species and may sell a maximum of ONE animal that they have exhibited from the following categories: Beef Steer, Dairy Steer, Lamb, Hog, Goat, Market Poultry, and Rabbit Pen. Note: Each 4-H/FFA member will be limited to selling only ONE species.
- 4. The Grand Champion Market Beef Steer, Dairy Steer, Market Goat, Market Lamb and Market Hog must be sold through the Sale. Exhibitors of the Reserve Champions in these divisions may sell their animals if they choose. If an exhibitor has both Grand and Reserve Champion of the same species, only the Grand Champion will sell.
- 5. A Grading Committee or the Specie Official Judge will review all animals nominated for the Sale and determine which animals are to be sold. The committee's decision is final. The market beef steers and the market dairy steers will be selected at the conclusion of the steer shows. The maximum number of each species to be sold is set by the Sale Committee and is shown below along with other requirements.

- The top five (5) animals in each of the market species shows will be eligible for the MD State Fair Livestock Sale. Only the Grand Champion will be required to sell.
- If nominated by the exhibitors, the Champion Rate of Gain (of all 4 species) and the Champion Bred and Owned Steer may be included in the overall selection process by the respective species judges, but do not have automatic sale slots.
- Market Steer Eligibility: Grand (must sell), Reserve Grand, 3rd through 5th overall and any remaining Breed Champions that opt to sell. Steers to fill
 any remaining slots will be selected by the Beef Show Judge.
- Market Hog Eligibility: Grand (must sell), Reserve Grand, 3rd through 5th overall. Any remaining Purebred Division Champions and Reserves;
 Crossbred Division Champion and Reserves. Remaining slots are selected by lottery picks starting with Crossbred Class Winners.
- Market Lamb and Market Goat Eligibility: Grand (must sell), Reserve Grand, 3rd through 5th Overall. Remaining slots to be determined by respective species judge.
- 6. All sale animals are subject to blood, tissue, urine, and other bodily fluid testing.
- 7. No resales are allowed through the ring. All sale animals identified for resale are sold as a group to a packer at current market price.
- 8. Refer to the respective Division for additional information pertaining to sale animal requirements.
- 9. The 4-H/FFA member is expected to present their animal in the sale ring. A request for an exception must be in writing and given to the Chair by 12:00 noon on the Sunday prior to the sale. Decisions by the Maryland State Fair Management are final. 4-H/FFA Members must wear proper show attire while presenting their animals in the sale ring (see General Rules and Regulations). Sellers are responsible for delivering their animals to designated holding pens before the auction and immediately after the animal is sold. Feed and feeding implements, if needed, will need to be left with the animals, if so deemed by the appropriate department superintendents.
- 10. 4-H/FFA Members are expected to recruit potential buyers for the sale.
- 11. Sellers or any agent thereof are not allowed to approach buyers before, during or after the Sale to acquire a sale animal. Sellers found to be in violation of this rule will forfeit all income from the sale of the animal and will be referred to the 4-H and FFA State Fair Review Board where additional sanctions may be imposed.
- 12. In the event that a carcass of a sale animal is condemned by USDA inspectors, the buyer is given a choice of a full refund of the sale price or replacement of an equal quality and weight animal of the respective species, BY THE SELLER.
- 13. Sales Checks will be released to the seller upon receipt of a Thank You note from the seller to the buyer. Buyer addresses will be sent to members by mid-September. Mail completed Thank You notes to the Maryland State Fair. Lost checks or checks not cashed within 60 days of check date will be subject to a \$40 reprocessing fee.
- 14. A 6% commission fee will be deducted from each sale to cover costs of the Sale i.e. promotion, pictures. Appropriate beef, pork, lamb check-off fees will also be deducted.
- All Sales Are Final. Terms are Net Cash at the Close of the Sale. Payments may be made by cash, Visa, MasterCard, Discover, American Express or personal check.
- 16. Ownership and title passes to the buyer or their representative at the time of purchase. The buyer assumes ownership and responsibility for the animal at this time. Maryland State Fair, 4-H/FFA, and/or the seller is not responsible for any injury, sickness or death of the animal beyond the point of sale.
- 17. The sale committee will make every effort to deliver purchased animals to their processor of choice within reason. The buyer is responsible for arranging the removal of purchased animals designated as "Haul by Buyer" from the fairgrounds. Animals must be removed by 10 am on the day following the Sale, unless made with the Sale Chairs in advance.

4-H/FFA ALL-STAR SHOWMANSHIP CONTESTS

Superintendents: Ashley Travis, Chris Anderson and Becky Ridgeway

Section Rules & Regulations:

- 1. Entries will be limited to the current year's Grand Champion Showmanship winner in the following species: Beef, Camelids, Dairy Cattle, Dairy Steers, Dairy Goats, Meat Goats, Sheep, and Swine.
- 2. Two events will be held:
 - a. 4-H/FFA All-Star Showmanship for Market Livestock Sunday, August 24, 2025, 5:00pm or at the conclusion of the last species show includes: Beef, Dairy Steers, Meat Goats, Sheep, and Swine.
 - b. 4-H/FFA All-Star Showmanship for Camelids & Dairy Sunday, September 7, 2025, 5:00pm or at the conclusion of the last species show includes: Camelids, Dairy Cattle, and Dairy Goats.
- 3. If the Grand Champion winner from a species chooses not to compete, the exhibitor must notify the superintendent immediately so the Reserve Grand Champion Showmanship winner from that species can participate.
- 4. The Dress Code will be 4-H or FFA dress attire.
- 5. **Each contestant will show each species for a 3-minute time period**, beginning with the species for which they were named Grand Champion winner. At the end of the time limit, the contestant will rotate onto the next species. The competition will conclude when each contestant has shown each species.
- 6. Contestants must provide the animal with which they won their respective showmanship division. This animal will be used by all contestants through the rotation sequence. Animal substitutions are allowed at the discretion of the superintendents.
- 7. Judges will be provided with a score card and judging criteria.
- 8. The scores from each species will be added and the contestant with the highest combined score will win. In the event that two contestants have the same combined score, a tie will be broken in this order:
 - a. The contestant with the highest score on the species that qualified him or her for All-Star Showmanship wins.
 - b. The contestant with the most consistent set of scores across all species wins.
- Awards: Sponsored by Maryland State Fair Livestock Fund. Overall Winner of the two All-Star Showmanship Contests will receive \$500. Each of
 the other contestants will receive \$200.
- 10. Criteria for the contest will be:
 - a. Showmanship Characteristics- 15 points
 - b. Handling of Animal 50 points
 - c. Knowledge of Species-25 points
 - d. Cooperation with Judge 10 points
